### North Dakota Department of Health Urges Caregivers to Register Car Seats During Child Passenger Safety Month

As part of Child Passenger Safety Month in February, the North Dakota Department of Health (NDDoH) emphasizes the importance of registering car seats and reminds caregivers that unregulated products should not be used with their car seats. It is very easy to register a car seat and essential to a child's safety. It is also important to use best practices with car seats, which includes not modifying them or adding items that may affect their integrity or ability to prevent injury in a crash.

There were numerous car seat recalls that occurred in 2014, which emphasized the need for caregivers to register car seats. Registration of car seats makes it possible for manufacturers to notify consumers if there is a safety issue with their car seat. Car seats, by federal law, are sold with a registration card that the consumer should use to register their seat. If consumers do not register the seat, they may not hear of a recall, which may put children at risk. Data collected from car seat checkups conducted by the department in 2014 showed that 40 percent of the car seats checked had not been registered with the car seat manufacturer. These consumers would not have been notified if their seat had been recalled. Consumers, who want to register their car seats now can visit www.safercar.gov or contact the car seat manufacturer directly.

The Department of Health would also like to remind consumers that they should not use unregulated products with their car seats, because they may affect the integrity of the safety features of the seat. Examples of products that should not be added to car seats include head pillows/body blankets, harness covers, vehicle seat protectors, mirrors and extra padding. According to data collected from the same car seat check-ups in 2014, approximately 20 percent of the seats checked had an unsafe product added. Of the 20 percent that were found, only 61 percent of the caregivers removed the unsafe product.

NDDoH recommends following these best practices when it comes to transporting children:

- Children younger than 13 should ride in the back seat.
- REAR-FACING: Children should ride rear-facing until at least 2 years of age (following car seat instructions)
- **FORWARD-FACING**: When children are at least 2 years of age or have outgrown the highest rear-facing limits of their car seat, they may ride forward-facing in a car seat with a harness. Use the seat until the child reaches the harness's highest weight limit allowed by the manufacturer.
- **BOOSTERS:** When children have outgrown the harness in their forward-facing car seat, they may be moved to a booster. The child should be at least 40 pounds and at least 4 years of age. Keep the child in the booster until about 4'9" tall.
- **SEAT BELT:** Children should use a seat belt when it fits over the body correctly. For a seat belt to fit properly, the lap belt must lie snugly across the upper thighs and be snug across the shoulder and chest. It should not lie on the stomach or across the neck.

These have included a wide variety of topics and are mailed to clients and found on the Pembina County Public Health web site (http:// www.pembinacountynd.gov/county/ departments/46/). She has also coordinated the use of many of our Safe Kids displays, including posters, table-top banners and educational materials. She sets up these displays in the lobby of their office and assures that they are routinely changed out with current information.

We applaud Kallie for her hard work and on-going efforts to spread Safe Kids Grand Forks' safety messages. It is through people like her with a passion for injury prevention and helping others that

### **Nido Car Seat Wrap**

The company 7A.M. Enfant has a great new product called the Nido. This quilted car seat baby wrap protects your infant or toddler from the cold and replaces the need for a winter coat. What makes this wrap safe for car seat use and different than other wraps on the market is the large oval cutout in the back – eliminating extra layers between the car seat and baby's back while allowing full access to the car seat's harness. This wrap can be set in the car seat and baby

- 2. Get certified! Your certification

- is for 2 years and costs \$115.00.
- 3. Attend car seat checkups locally as your schedule allows. Our checkups in Grand Forks are the 2nd Thursday of every month at Rydell's from 4 pm to 7 pm.

  Come for as much time as you can, all help is welcome! There are also many area checkups throughout the summer months.
- 4. Continuing education –

requirements are 6 hours, 5 seats signed off by an instructor or proxy and at least one car seat checkup event per certification cycle!

### Child Passenger Safety Recommendations

### When to move into a booster seat





- The minimum standard is for children to be in a forward facing car seat with a harness system until <u>at least</u> age 4 and 40 pounds.
- Many seats have higher harness weights (from 50 80+ pounds) that when used, will keep a child safer longer. A 5-point harness provides the best protection in a crash. It is recommend to use a harness as long as possible.
- The child has outgrown their car seat with a harness when they have reached the upper weight limit of the seat, the top of the child's ears are above the top of the seat or the harness strap is below the shoulders.
- Remember to use the top tether on your car seat according to the car seat and vehicle manufacturer's directions.
- Your child should always ride in the back seat if they are 12 years old or younger.

Why can't I bundle up my kids in their child safety seat?

Although temps are dropping and our best instinct is to bundle our children up against the cold winter weather, this is not the safest practice in any child safety seat. If you have to loosen the straps just to be able to buckle your child into their seat, the

straps are now too loose to hold their body securely in place during a crash. This leaves your child vulnerable to major injuries in the event of a crash! \*\*Check out the Nido car seat baby wrap on page 7 for another option to keep your child warm in these cold months.

According to the DMV, the crash rate for 16 year olds is 3.7 times higher than all other ages of drivers.

As the parent and the owner of the vehicle, here are some ways you can decrease the risk for your teen becoming a statistic.

- Ban all cell phone use during driving
  - No texts, no calls, no hands free devices
- Limit the number of passengers in the car. The less passengers, the less distractions
- All passengers buckle up all the time
- Limit driving during icy conditions, night time and any

severe weather

- ND limits driving after sunset and before 5 am
- No alcohol or illegal substances by anyone in the car

With the help of a few simple rules in place, everyone should arrive safely to their destination!

Available car seats include:


- Convertible and Forward-Facing Car Seats for children weighing 5

### Vehicle Backup Systems: New NHTSA Rule

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) will require rearview technology in all new cars and many light trucks beginning May 1, 2018 to meet the new rear-visibility standards. This is an effort to reduce deaths and serious injuries caused by backup accidents.

Backup crashes involving light vehicles cause an average of 210 deaths and 15,000 injuries a year, and victims often are children and the elderly. NHTSA said the new rule, required in the Cameron Gulbransen Kids Transportation Safety Act, will save between 13 to 15 lives per year and prevent as many as 1,125 injuries annually. NHTSA estimates that a rearview system will cost between \$132 and \$142 per vehicle although many vehicles offer a system now as an option.

The act was named for a 2-year-old Long Island boy whose pediatrician father backed over him in their driveway in 2002.

REMEMBER THE DAYS OF RIDING IN THE BACK OF YOUR PARENTS STATION WAGON?

Do you remember the days when you rode in the back of your mom and dad's station wagon? How about the days of sitting on their lap or playing with toys on the floor of the vehicle? There was a time when mom's arm across your chest was intended to "serve as a restraint" in a crash too. But, we have come a long way in the area of protecting people in motor vehicles. However, motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death for individuals under age 35 so we want to offer these tips to help keep not only your children safe, but all occupants in the vehicle.

The automobile and car seat manufacturers are doing their part to keep up with the times and enhance their technology so if we do our part, the trips in motor vehicles can be safer for all of us. Here are some easy steps to take:

- ⇒ Have your child's car seat checked by a trained technician for proper use. There are
- locations to have this done all over the country. To find a check-up event near you, visit www.safekids.org.
- ⇒ Make sure that each and every person in the vehicle is restrained in the proper device. That may be a car seat, a booster seat or a seat belt and it will vary based on the age, height and weight of the occupant. Buckle up—every trip, every person!! Kids watch the adults in the vehicle and whether they talk about it or not, your nonverbal cues are role modeled to

- them each and every time they ride with you. Again, buckle up—every trip, every person.
- ⇒ Discuss the rules of the road/vehicle with your children and young adults so when they are riding with others or in their own car, they know what your expectations are.
- ⇒ Remember that distractions such as talking on the phone or texting are becoming increasingly common as factors in a crash. Don't drive distracted, whether with a cell phone or other activities that take your eyes off the road and your hands off the wheel of the car.

This training provides the basic technical skills, experience and knowledge about the proper use and installation of child car seats that are needed when working with parents and caregivers with child passenger safety needs.




#### Course Content
